The Pioneers Division is seeking nominations for two important leadership positions on the Division's Board of Directors: President-Elect and Secretary.

Candidates will be asked to provide a photograph that will be used as part of the subsequent ballot along with written responses to the following four questions:

- What types of leadership roles have you served within CEC?
- How long have you been a member of the Pioneers Division?
- As you think about the future of the Division, CEC, and the field of special education, what are some of the opportunities and challenges you would like to see the Division address in the near future?
- What unique talents and abilities do you believe you will bring to your role on the Board?

Nominations are due by 5:00 pm (anywhere on earth), October 21, 2022. Elections will occur in November with the results announced in early December. Each term of office begins January 1, 2023.

Candidates should be aware that the Division is in the process of changing its name. These actions will likely continue to impact the board's activities in 2023 as we engage in the necessary legal, financial, and practical considerations associated with a new name change, strategic plan, etc. As a result, we are seeking new leaders who embrace the opportunities this transition will afford.

Duties of the President-Elect: The successful candidate will make a three-year commitment to Division leadership. The first year as President-Elect, this person organizes the Division's program at the annual CEC convention, attends monthly board meetings, and participates in guarterly inter-divisional conference calls, as well as the annual CEC Leadership training event. In the second year, this person serves as President of the Division and is responsible for overseeing all divisional activities. Some of these duties include: chairing a monthly meeting of the board, appointing committee chairs, and enhancing the division's contributions to the Council and other Divisions. In the third year, this person becomes the Past President and attends monthly board meetings and Chairs the Nomination Committee.

Duties of the Secretary: The successful candidate will serve a three-year term on the Board and be responsible for capturing and disseminating the minutes of each board meeting, annual membership meeting, and any special meetings. The Secretary will work closely with the leadership team (President, President-Elect, and Past President) as well as the Treasurer to ensure that all official documents are archived appropriately. This person will also prepare and submit the annual report to CEC.

- 1. **Maynard Reynolds** Past president of CEC; pioneered research in domain-and criterionreferenced testing that preceded important work on curriculum-based assessment; and originator of the term "continuum of placement."
- 2. Lloyd Dunn Past president of CEC; developed the Peabody Picture Vocabulary Development Test and the Peabody Language Development Kit, which have been used in many special education and early childhood programs.
- 3. **Romaine Mackie** Former US Commissioner of Education, Pioneers Division Leadership Award named for the individual.
- Donn Brolin Developed the Life-Centered Career Education Curriculum: A Competency-Based Approach (22 editions), now called the Life-Centered Education Transition Curriculum, remaining a best seller publication of the Council for Exceptional Children.
- 5. **James Gallagher** Past president of CEC; influenced the development of the Division for Early Childhood; and the first chief of the Bureau of the Education of the Handicapped.
- 6. **Ray Graham -** Past president of CEC; "father of special education" for the state of Illinois; and led The Council in developing a multi-tiered membership organization with local and national membership units.
- 7. John Kidd Past president of CEC; known as the "elder statesman from Missouri"; one of the founders of the Foundation for Exceptional Children; ensured that all action taken by the Delegate Assembly followed Robert's Rules of Order and the CEC Constitution and Bylaws.
- 8. **Elizabeth Farrell** First president of CEC; one of the twelve founders of The Council for Exceptional Children: designed the ungraded school model for the New York schools; and began the Ungraded Journal.
- 9. **Harley Wooden** Past president of CEC; first editor of Exceptional Children; and personally funded several years of support to publish the Journal of Exceptional Children.
- 10. J.E. Wallace Wallin Funded and originated a CEC award honoring lifetime special education achievement and founded the American Psychological Association.
- 11. **Francis Lord** Past president of CEC; expanded the scope of Exceptional Children to include all categories of exceptionality; and prepared the first written history of The Council in 1980.

- 12. William Cruikshank Past president of CEC; field leader in brain injury construct/intellectual and developmental disabilities; and founded the International Academy for Research in Learning Disabilities.
- 13. **Samuel Kirk** Past president of CEC; first to use and define the category of "learning disabilities;" sometimes referred to as "the father of special education;" and developed the Illinois Test of Psycholinguistic Abilities.
- 14. Samuel Ashcroft Past president of CEC; founding president of the Foundation for Exceptional Children; chair of the Committee on International Children's Year; developed and coordinated a regional program in Tennessee of preparation for teachers of blind and visually impaired; and inducted along with Helen Keller into the first Hall of Fame for Leaders and Legends of the Blindness Field.
- 15. Frances Connor Past president of CEC; leadership in closing the Willowbrook State School in New York led to the passage of the Civil Rights of Institutionalized Persons Act of 1980; created the leading graduate-level teacher training program at Teachers College, Columbia during the eighties; and procured a multi-million dollar grant that allowed Teacher's College to construct Thorndike Hall.





Debi Gartland, our Representative to the CEC Knowledge and Skills Sub-Committee, reports that the Sub-Committee met in August and September and has made final edits to the **2017 CEC Specialty Knowledge and Skill Set Validation Resource Manual**. Debi is part of the KSS workgroup to revise the **Individualized General Curriculum Specialty Set** which will begin its work later in the fall.

Research clearly shows that factors such as positive school climate, academic success and high school completion/graduation are associated with reduced criminal activity. Yet, there is evidence that schools continue to adopt mechanisms and disciplinary practices that contribute to disengagement, increase drop-out rates, and lead student involvement with criminal activity.

In this session, the presenters will discuss the disturbing national trend known as the **"school to prison pipeline**," where children are funneled out of public schools into the juvenile and criminal justice systems. Presenters will address school related factors that lead to incarceration and issues of transition and reentry back into the community. They will conclude with a framework of best practices of reentry that incorporate positive youth development, interagency collaboration, stakeholder awareness, youth voice, and cognitive restructuring.

CEC Endorses Legislation to Provide Loan Forgiveness to Educators

The Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) has joined 50 organizations to endorse legislation to improve and extend the current Teacher Loan Forgiveness program. The new legislation called the Loan Forgiveness for Educators Act of 2022 eases the financial burden on educators with student loan debt. The bill would have the federal government make an educator's monthly payments and forgive federal loans after five years of employment as an educator. It also extends loan forgiveness to early childhood educators and school leaders. The bill's purpose is "to enhance student access to a wellprepared, diverse, and stable educator workforce

by eliminating debt burdens for educators in return for service teaching and leading in high need schools or early childhood education programs." CEC works with Congress on all aspects of the educator pipeline and supports efforts to improve the recruitment, preparation, and retention of educators, including through efforts to reduce the higher education financial burden.

ED Awards 24.8M to Strengthen a Diverse Teacher Workforce

In an announcement issued on September 12th, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) released awards to 22 new grantees, amounting to \$24.8 million. Awardees include three Historically Black Colleges and Universities (Coppin State, Winston Salem State University, Prairie View A&M University) and one Minority Serving Institution (University of Texas at El Paso).



We are saddened to announce the passing of Dr. Jennifer Tong on Wednesday, August 24th after a long and courageous battle with cancer. Jennifer was born in Nanaimo, British Columbia, and grew up in Vancouver. Inspired by her hard-working parents she strove to excel academically and received her B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of British Columbia. Her research focused on Special Education Policy, and how to identify and address specific needs of students with behavior disorders and mental illness. Jennifer was involved in special education for over 30 years. In her professional work life and through professional organizations including CEC, Jennifer was a tireless advocate and relentless in her determination to see that all children received the tools and opportunities they needed to succeed. Jennifer served on the CEC board for two consecutive terms, the Canadian CEC board, of which she was a past-president, the executives of BC CEC and the BC Council of Administrators of Special Education (BC CASE) and was a member of other CEC divisions including the Pioneers. She participated in and chaired many committees and work groups along the way. Jennifer was devoted to her family and is survived by her mother, Helen Hiroko Ono, husband Ken, children Maya (David) and Curtis, and sister Joanne (Dan). She is predeceased by her father Arthur Ono. Her warm smile would "light up a room" and she will be missed by everyone who knew her for her significant contributions to CEC and the field, as well as her kindness and caring and loyal friendship.

Tribute to Mary Scott, Past President Ontario Federation of The Council for Exceptional Children

The definition of a pioneer woman is a person who is among the earliest in her field thus opening it for the development by others.

Mary Scott is a pioneer in Ontario in Special Education through her leadership in the education, in-servicing and professional development of teachers and administrators in the education of differently abled children and youth. Mary received The Fred Bartlett Memorial Award for Outstanding Contribution to Education in Ontario. Ms. Scott devoted many years in her career to making a commitment to every child in the York Region school system in King Township and as an instructor on Ontario Ministry of Education special education courses and as an Adjunct Professor in the Faculty of Education, York University. In May, 2022 Mary celebrated her 100th birthday.

She believes that it is important to work with others for the good of each child and help parents to understand the programs and services available to their children. Early in her career Mary became concerned about students who were challenged in a rural county setting and in her work she became very interested in remedial reading and support for students with learning difficulties. Ms. Scott convinced many teachers and administrators to enroll in special education certification courses, and in her school system, encouraged many teachers to move into special education programs and was a mentor to many educators over the years.

The Council for Exceptional Children (CEC) has been a big and important part of Mary Scott's life and career. She devoted many years in support of the work of The Council for Exceptional Children locally and provincially. She participated in provincial, national and International conferences over the years and attended the World Council of CEC in Stirling, Scotland. She began her work in CEC as Secretary of York Region Chapter 543 and served as the Secretary of the Ontario Council for Administrators of Special Education. Mary became a member of the leadership group of the Ontario Federation of The Council for Exceptional Children and served as the Provincial President in 1984 after being encouraged to do so by Marion McLeod, an Ontario CEC leader. The theme of the provincial CEC conference during Mary's leadership was "Commitment To Every Child".

Melinda Gates said that a woman with a voice is by definition a strong woman. But the search to find that voice can be remarkably difficult. Mary would tell you that she was never shy inside but she was challenged to speak in front of a group. But she found strength to speak out early in her career and continued to be a significant voice on behalf of students who had difficulty adjusting to the constant changes in education and teaching. Being of Scottish heritage and born in Indiana, Mary was resolved to make a difference as an educator. Through increasing her knowledge base and a resourceful approach, having empathy, being honest in dealing with others and having fun in the process Mary became a successful networker with school board officials and trustees. Mary valued a sense of humor in getting the job done. She provided information to people upon request. Later in her career, Mary became the Coordinator of the Jefferson Teacher Centre in York Region. Teachers found assistance there and speakers provided in-service at that resource centre.

Mary Scott began teaching in 1941, taking some leave time for family commitments. She retired from education in 1985, but in true Mary fashion, she continued to be active in her community. She has received an honor from King Township as Citizen of the Year for her involvement in the Laskay Womens' Institute. Mary has written ten plays to tell the story of Laskay, a small village in York Region which involved students. She has raised funds for the work of the Womens' Institute.

Julia Child, American Chef, Author and Television Personality has advised to find something you're passionate about and keep tremendously interested in it. Early in life, Mary Scott found her passion – COMMITMENT TO EVERY CHILD. Mary's career has been exemplary in this cause.

Mary represents the leadership and legacy that has allowed CEC to be a successful organization for 100 years. She also serves as a link to future legacies with her example and the work done by the many that she has brought into the field and personally mentored.

Webinar on Maltreatment and Trauma

The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in many young children and teens who were isolated in their homes, without the support of school and mental health services. Many of these children and young people experienced trauma because of child abuse, loss of a family member or everyday anxiety about the virus and unpredictable routines. Even though most schools returned to normal routines last year and this year, many children are still trying to cope with the trauma experienced during the past few years. Educators need to understand the effects of trauma and maltreatment and how to support the children and youth who have faced maltreatment and/or trauma.

Topics to be addressed:

This series of three webinars will address the following:

- 1. What are maltreatment and trauma and how might they affect children and youth?
- 2. What do therapists want educators to know about maltreatment and trauma?
- 3. What interventions can educators use in the classroom to support students who have experienced maltreatment and/or trauma?

The individual should be nominated by someone who is familiar with the nature and quality of his/her work and who can speak to the nominee's character.
